From the Chair

Welcome to this Autumn edition of the Village Voice. Summer may not have been very long this year but at least we did get more than our fair share of sunshine compared with many areas of the UK - How often do you hear on the forecast: "mostly dry - except Northern Ireland, NW England and Scotland"! We are indeed fortunate in the East!

Before I dive into an update of village news I want to take this opportunity to say "thank you and farewell" to Cathy Emerson, my Vice Chair who left the Parish Council (PC) in August. Cathy has been a Councillor for 4 years and was the Vice-Chair for the last 12 months or so. She had an eclectic portfolio which covered the River Lark, local businesses and residents, Active Travel, planning, defibrillator, and a number of other issues as and when they arose. She was particularly supportive as Vice-Chair during the early days when we were making sweeping changes to the PC's modus operandi. Cathy and her husband David have been tremendous supporters of the PC and the village in general and we wish them both well for the future.

Despite hoping to have August free of meetings we did have to meet as the "planning train" never ceases to keep on rolling!

This time we had to make comment on the plans for 2 tennis courts and 2 pickleball at the All Saints Hotel. We tried to get an extension but failed - who would have thought there was such a rush!

As you may be aware, the law dictates that we have to hold a public meeting to help inform our decision with regard to planning applications affecting the village - this we did on 13th August. The Minutes can be found later in the magazine.

Further planning issues were also discussed during our planned meeting in September - these included a new car parking area for 15 cars at the All Saints Hotel and an energy storage unit at the Pigeon Lane Anglian Water site. We are still awaiting planning decisions regarding:

A. The Driver Training School at the bottom of Tut Hill (next to the Bury St Edmunds Golf Course entrance), and **B.** The maintenance entrance into the All Saints Golf Course from the B1106 (The Street).

After changes to both operating hours and procedures, the All Saints Hotel outside gym has now received planning permission and classes have begun.

However, and in my humble opinion, the most important planning issue currently affecting the village (both Pigeon Lane and The Street - near the entrance to Lark's Gate) is the proposed amelioration of the errant golf ball problem.

Members of the public from Pigeon Lane who attended the September meeting spoke of smashed doors, windows, and solar panels, dented cars, and far worse, injuries to a child and the death of a cat. Balls are also crossing the B1106.

The PC supported fully the application to erect 2 large nets on the course to prevent the balls leaving the area but having looked in detail at the situation, remain concerned that the issue will not be fully resolved.

This concern has been raised to West Suffolk Council planners in our response to the application and at the September meeting with our County Councillor - Beccy Hopfensberger.

We will now have to wait and see what the reality on the ground is after the nets are constructed and take any further action as necessary.

Finally on planning, we received, on the very day of the September meeting, an application for a revamp of the driving range and adjacent parking at the Bury St Edmunds Golf Course. This will be assessed by the Planning Team and discussed at the October meeting.

All the planning issues mentioned above are covered in the PC Minutes.

There are three of us on the Planning Team - and I want to let you know that I am eternally grateful to Cllrs Jill Mayhew and Derek Brown for all their hard work and diligence with regard to this seemingly everlasting challenge.

Volunteering has been continuing apace over the Summer - the entrance to the Community Centre was given an overhaul and the village green has been cut back to reveal a lot more pavement. A number of road signs and street furniture have been cleaned and the flag pole is now white! Flowerbeds have been tended and are now ready for Autumn and trees have been pruned to allow unimpeded walking along pavements. So THANK YOU to all of you that have got involved and made such a difference.

I am especially pleased to note that a number of residents are also quietly but noticeably helping with keeping the areas near them under control. This is much appreciated and encouraged where safe to do so.

There are still jobs to do but the Village is looking much smarter for all your efforts. We are aware of the narrowness of the A1101 pavement but that is currently the subject of a tussle with Highways who consider the path acceptable.

Many of you had noticed the huge trenches that were dug on the old pig field (Moseleys Farm Business Park) and have asked me what was happening.

Answer: The West Suffolk Local Plan has earmarked this site for an extension of the Cemetery, a number of new business units, and 10 houses. The trenches were for the archaeological dig which is the first part of the planning process. Nothing found - to answer your next question! The owner has informed

me that planning should be submitted by October and then work will commence thereafter. This could take anywhere between 6 months to 2 years as the build is dependent on a number of factors.

The good news is that as part of the plan we hope to gain a footpath from Hengrave to FAS on the inside of the hedge along the A1101. This would allow an excellent circular walk involving the River Lark footpath.

Which brings me on nicely to report on a very positive meeting that Cllr Mat Stewart attended with Anglia Water. They are looking likely to have agreement from OFWAT to invest £9 Billion on the next 5 year phase of improvement and expenditure commencing April 2025. This will mean planned improvements for the FAS water treatment works and thus benefit the river. I know that Mat will be monitoring developments closely and will update you as the planned improvements are announced. He will be ably assisted by our new Cllr Richard Nicholls who has taken on some of Cathy's portfolio.

On the same subject, the PC plan to pay for an extra grass / nettle cut on the river path next year. This, together with monitoring the cut widths should to make the path accessible all year round. One little known fact... the PC can't use power tools (strimmer etc.) on the path as it is considered a "highway"! - really??

In other news...

Once we have a defibrillator fitted in the Community Centre it is hoped that we can arrange for residents to have lessons. At my age I think this is a great idea!

A small working group (WG), with help from WSC, has been set up to work on an Emergency Plan for the Village. Thank you Clirs Jill Mayhew and David Surman.

The good news is that we are looking to upgrade our vehicle

speed monitors (VAS) so that they are solar powered. Cllr Don Lynch, who is our traffic guru has done a great job in battery charging over the years and is investigating. The even better news is the Beccy Hopfensperger is hoping to pay for the upgrade from her Locality Budget!

In Allotment / Fuel Charity news I am pleased to say that the Allotment Management Committee headed by Cllr David Surman is running really well. We have managed to extricate the Board of Trustees from the PC business (as it should be) and other than a short update at PC meetings the Charity is run and financed completely separately - albeit that the Cllrs who are not allotment holders are Trustees of the Charity. (Confused? So were we!) Well done Justin on your hard work to achieve this.

And, finally, some personal news...

I joined the PC for 2 reasons - one was to get a new dog/litter bin sited on the way out of the village towards the Lark walk and the second was because a current Cllr at the time asked me to join to try and make the Council more effective and efficient. We have a new dog / litter bin and I am hopeful that we are well on our way to the latter.

18 months ago we started an internal WG to try and design the changes which were clearly needed. I took on the Vice Chair role to help effect and introduce these necessary new practices.

Just over a year ago, at the beginning of August, the previous Chair suddenly resigned and as they say, the rest is history.

Those who know me well will be aware that I had no aspiration to become the Chair but it was clear to me that we needed to carry on with what we had already achieved and still had planned. Those on the PC at the time will also remember that I said I would give it my best shot for a year.

We had a modernisation mountain to climb which has only

been made possible by our Clerk, Justin, who is incredibly efficient, forward thinking, and fun to work with. This professionalism, together with the support, help, and guidance, of every Cllr. made the task achievable and, dare I say, almost enjoyable.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all Cllrs for their hard work and dedication during the transition phase - especially Cllr Derek Brown who took over my portfolio of Assets etc. when I became Chair. He has also added planning and Community Centre representative to those responsibilities since.

There are now a number of personal, disparate, reasons which all point in the same direction that lead me to tender my resignation from the PC; this with be with effect from 15 October.

I look forward to handing over to my successor, whoever that might be, over the next few weeks.

Thank you again for all your support. It has been wonderful to have met so many of you in my time / role as Chair and hope to see you again soon - especially if you are volunteering!

Update from Meeting with Anglian Water

The Parish Council are in regular contact with Anglian Water (AW) to challenge them on the water quality in the Lark River. The below is a brief report from a recent meeting;

Rather upbeat team from AW on the teams meeting, they are looking likely to have agreement from OFWAT to invest £9 Billion on the next 5 year phase of improvement and expenditure commencing April 2025.

This will mean planned improvements for FAS WTW to include new upgrade phosphorous removal to try and achieve <0.2mg/l, some additional tertiary treatment at settlement lagoons and increased below ground large storm storage tanks, thus reducing overflow spills in heavy rainfall.

We (the PC) requested early notification when these are approved and planned so we can communicate the news.

They are still getting confidence in the new monitoring of spills but encouraged us to use the AW live mapping, but also continue liaising directly if we wish.

Unfortunately the 24/7 monitoring data is not held by AW and they do not have immediate access to this but we can request via Jo Thompson (Senior Area Manager);

With the upgraded equipment and the 24/7 devices, FAS WTW is the most and best monitored site within AW. Jo is here to help, and has extensive knowledge of the works and Lark as previously managed the site.

David Hudson (Flempton cum Hengrave PC) reported river temp in Lackford at 18C looks like STW discharge is across the year 19-8C with average of 10-12C.

Flag ship status report

This was explained as basically concluded, however a 2nd report is now in process that will identify opportunity for improvement works and where draft report due March 2025.

This is where we will be able to comment and suggest areas of improvement with a focus on partnership approach - the reason AW FAS WTW was not mentioned was that the report was not focusing on AW assets apparently.

Agreed to arrange a meet in March 2025 to further understand 5 year program & discuss flag ship report 2.

Fornham All Saints Parish Council August Extraordinary Meeting

Approved Minutes from Extraordinary Parish Council Meeting

Tuesday 13th August 2024, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

Present:

Cllr Martin Loveridge (ML) (Chair), Cllr Cathy Emerson (CE) (Vice Chair) and Cllrs Jill Mayhew (JM), Don Lynch (DL), Derek Brown (DB), David Surman (DS) and Richard Nicholls (RN).

Clerk Justin Hook (JH), and 3 members of the public.

Agenda Items

1. <u>Chairman's welcome, opening remarks and to receive</u> apologies for absence

ML explained need to call extraordinary meeting to discuss planning as extension was not granted to allow discussion at September meeting.

Apologies received and accepted from Cllr Mat Stewart, County Cllr Rebecca Hopfensberger and District Cllr Sarah Broughton.

- 2. (i) To receive members Declarations of Interests none received
 - (ii) Council to consider any new written requests for dispensation and/or requests which have been received none received
- 3. Public open session up to 15 minutes questions and issues on matters arising from the agenda and from the village
 Resident Question 1: What is happening re: golf balls in Pigeon Lane?

A resident of Pigeon Lane has raised the issue of golf ball safety and sought legal advice against All Saints Hotel (AS)

following the removal of safety netting/fencing at the rear of their property.

There has been ongoing dialogue between the resident, AS and the PC.

AS has now submitted planning application to reinstate netting/fencing as per the original permissions. The PC has questions relating to efficacy if golf course layout has since been amended. Awaiting detail once the planning application is available on the portal.

Resident has suspended litigation, on basis planning application has been actioned.

RN Question: Is this a PC issue, and what is the PC's objective?

CE: The PC has been asked by residents to assist and is helping mediate between AS and affected parties.

ML: suggested liaising with residents of Pigeon Lane, inviting them to attend September PC meeting where the planning application can be discussed fully and ensure plan in place to follow up planning application.

ACTION: JH to add golf ball safety discussion to September agenda.

Resident Question 2: What is happening with the overgrown (often impassable) Lark Valley path?

CE has been liaising with SCC Rights of Way (RoW) team and confirms we are one of only two paths that get 3 cuts per year. Cut to 1.5m, the stinging nettles do still fall back over. Some fallen fences also.

CE following up on fallen fences and has received a quote of £200 for an extra cut from Fornham to Hengrave.

Question over whether RoW team actually have cut 1.5m - photo evidence would be required so that PC can follow up with RoW/contractor.

CE updated re: path repairs - still waiting on finance to come through in order to complete works.

ACTION: JH to add to potential extra cut to the Lark Valley path to September agenda. RN to lead on this item for

September meeting.

4. Planning:

i. DC/24/0538/FUL

All Saints Hotel The Street Fornham St Genevieve Suffolk IP28 6JQ

Planning application - two pickleball courts and two tennis courts

Some concerns raised over closeness to properties and potential for noise inconvenience and disturbance. Application states no lighting, which ought be included as a constraint. Council liked that facilities would be available to residents, but also suggested there ought be restricted hours of play, much like the ongoing discussions for the outdoor gym.

It was noted that the two neighbouring properties disappointingly were not notified by WSC.

JM proposed to approve, ML seconded, 3 in favour, 2 object, proposal carried.

ii. ML proposed to approve payment of the Clerks base salary by Standing Order, in arrears and on the 1st of each month. Extra hours where appropriate to be approved and paid as an additional payment. CE seconded, unanimous decision.

Draft Minutes from Parish Council Meeting

Tuesday 17th September 2024, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

These draft minutes will be approved at the Parish Council Meeting on 15th October.

Present:

Cllr Martin Loveridge (ML) (Chair) and Cllrs Jill Mayhew (JM), Mat Stewart (MS), Don Lynch (DL), David Surman (DS) and Richard Nicholls (RN).

County Cllr Rebecca Hopfensperger (RH), Clerk Justin Hook (JH), and 8 members of the public.

Agenda Items

- 1. Chairman's welcome, opening remarks and to receive apologies for absence
 - ML welcomed and thanked everybody for their attendance. ML publicly thanked Cllr Cathy Emerson for her hard work, dedication and support, in her four years as Councillor and 12 months as Vice Chair. It was also noted that her husband had also been a great help and support along the way, and they were both wished all the best.
 - Apologies received and accepted from Cllr Derek Brown and District Cllr Sarah Broughton.
- 2. (i) To receive members Declarations of Interests none received.
 - (ii) Council to consider any new written requests for dispensation and/or requests which have been received none received.
- 3. To approve & adopt the minutes from the Council meeting held on the 16th July 2024 and the extraordinary meeting held on the 13th August 2024

Council resolved to approve two sets of minutes, with the amendment to July's minutes as identified.

4. <u>To receive County Councillor's report from Cllr. Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>

RH advised the £500 million devolution deal for Suffolk is no longer happening and that government is looking for 'super' devolution deals, maybe Suffolk & Norfolk or the whole of East Anglia. More talks to follow.

RH confirmed it is unknown the effect this will have on the West Suffolk Hospital plans.

New, simpler domestic recycling programme to come into play in 2026 as part of national standardisation. To include glass and food waste, but black bin possibly only collected on a 3 weekly schedule. £5.5miliion cost to WSC to upgrade transfer stations.

ML questioned financial loss for communities with bottle banks. RH is raising this concern.

- 5. <u>To receive Borough Councillor's reports from Cllr. Sarah Broughton and Cllr Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>
 Nothing further to report.
- 6. Public open session up to 15 minutes questions and issues on matters arising from the agenda and from the village
 Resident raised concerns over state of footpath at bottom of Pigeon Lane overgrown hedges and brambles need cutting back.

SCC responsibility.

Action: Clerk to raise on portal and advise RH, who will then follow up.

Danger of golf balls to Pigeon Lane and B1106
 Council to discuss follow up to concerns over planning for safety nets

ML showed full bucket of golf balls from just one resident's garden. 2 resident emails were read.

Residents spoke of wayward golf balls causing damage to conservatories, double glazed windows, double glazed doors, roof tiles, greenhouses, cars and solar panels. In the past, a child has sustained injuries from a stray golf ball hitting her leg and a residents cat was killed instantly after a stray golf ball hit it in the head.

Questions/points raised:

• When does it become a Health & Safety issue? / Who is responsible for the golf balls? Are the balls marked? / Do the golfers have insurance? / Little or no recourse from players, even if you do manage to catch them / Has it affected residents abilities to get insurance? / Has anybody had an insurance payout? / Has course layout changed? / Do the nets reflect these changes? / Ball technology has changed - balls being hit further/ higher/harder / Do the residents agree with the idea of netting? / Has a golf specialist been consulted over what measures are required?

The Council agreed that any measures to limit stray golf balls, were better than nothing.

July found us crossing The Lark to Fornham St Martin where David Yates gave a wonderful informative talk on the church. We had all attended services there, however never spent time exploring the charming interior and learning about its history.

The current church building was built in the 1330's and named after St Martin of Tours, a Roman soldier who became a

pacifist. He cut his cloak in two to give half to a beggar; later Christ appeared to him wearing the half cloak. This lead to Martin's conversion to Christianity.

There are two delightful 15th century misericords carvings (originally hinged seats) one of St Martin dividing his cloak and the other the martyrdom of St Thomas `a Becket.



Afterwards we were enthusiastically welcomed to Fornham House for tea and cake which was most enjoyable.

Continuing our church theme we visited All Saints Crowfield in August, described as a hidden gem. It certainly lived up to both those words. It took a combination of satnav and an ordinance survey map to find it and it was well worth the search! This remote pretty church is approached from a path, through a gate and looks like something from a fairy tale. It has the only timber framed chancel in Suffolk

Stewart White welcomed us and told us a little about the interior and history. The ancient church was larger than it looked from outside and was beautiful with the summer sun streaming in.

We had a tour of the churchyard and were shown the magnificent 'eco-loo' in its splendid bespoke wooden building! The church is a little gem and well worth a visit.



- 2. Review Minutes of last Meeting 28 May 2024
 - a. Minutes reviewed.
 - b. DB regarding the complaint received by the Parish Council about the noise during the car park upgrade work at the community centre. EG had been round on two occasions but no reply. DB has visited resident and apologised. During visit the resident has requested access to the community centre while they have their fence replaced. Committee agreed.
- 3. Hall Booking Update EG updated on hall bookings.

- c. Sum Up machine has not been used yet.
- d. Hirers of hall are paying by bank or cash but Sum Up could be used.
- e. Anglian Water had contacted advising there may be a leak. New meter had been fitted. Latest bill has now been received and is less than the last one. No water leakage problems. CLOSED
- 5. Hall & Ground Maintenance/Future Facilities
 - Painting not completed by previous painter who has now left the area. VC to put a request on NextDoor for decorator.
 - Sewerage complaint regarding drain overflowing.
 DrainDoctor came and sorted. Septic tank still needs to be emptied. Need a cover for drain – PP will action.
 EG will arrange for tank to be emptied.
 - c. Corner covers for walls need to be repaired. EG will try and fix first.
