We generally meet once a month (not including August or December, unless required) for a couple of hours to discuss village issues, ongoing projects, planning applications etc., with a small amount of work in between, keeping up with emails, working on projects and so on.

As Parish Clerk...

I thought I'd just update you on a couple of projects the Parish Council has been working on recently;

 New .gov.uk domain - best practice suggests that local councils adopt a .gov.uk domain for all email and website activities, which we have implemented. The Clerk and all Cllrs now have .gov.uk email address and the website is now sitting on our new .gov.uk domain;

- Pavement clearing this has been reported to SCC but budget cuts mean that the level of service to keep pavements clear of vegetation and hedges is greatly reduced. We are currently looking to appoint a contractor do some of this work ourselves, especially along the A1101 and B1106, to get the pavements back to full width
- VAS Units we've ordered new solar units to fit to the existing VAS's (Vehicle Activated Sign), and a new solar VAS to replace another old unit
- Community Orchard we're looking to get a community pruning workshop set up, so that we can prune the community orchard at Larks Gate
- River Lark we're pleased to hear that works are planned to firm up some of the banks along the River Lark Path up to Duck Sluice Farm, and lift some of the fallen fencing which has been restricting the path in places

That's just a taster! If there are other issues in the village that are affecting you - please drop me an email to let me know, or even better, come along to a meeting and share it in the 15 minute open session, direct to the Council.

Approved Minutes from Parish Council Meeting

Tuesday 15th October 2024, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

These minutes were approved at the Parish Council Meeting on 19th November.

Cllr Martin Loveridge (ML) (Chair) and Cllrs Jill Mayhew (JM), Derek Brown (DB), David Surman (DS) and Richard Nicholls (RN).

Current locations look good, although pole diameter slightly less than preferred. Third location requires new pole in different location. 15. Emergency Plan

DS Met with Tariq from WSC. Aim is to keep this plan as simple as possible.

Working group is compiling list of main contacts and potential key contractors. Community centre was identified as most obvious place for refuge.

Action: DB to speak to community centre.

16. Overgrown Pavements

Council is able to appoint their own contractor to carry out works in the village, providing the contractor has the correct licenses and the correct paperwork is completed for SCC approval.

Council resolved to get prices for the A1101 to be cut back and pavement skirted back and for the B1101 to be skirted back.

Action: Clerk to speak to Charlie Browne re: Pigeon Lane.

17. Community Centre Flower Bed

Council discussed community centre's request to create flower beds on the site of the old bottle banks, and request for Council to provide grant for flowers.

Council believe verge is SCC owned land.

Council resolved to revisit this idea once community centre has confirmed ownership and obtained correct license/permissions for flower bed.

18. Remembrance Day

Council resolved to appoint Andy's Jet Wash to clean the war memorial in return for free advertising in the Village Voice.

Council resolved to purchase a wreath from Royal British Legion.

JM agreed to organise laying the wreath.

19. <u>Lithium Ion Battery Safety Campaign</u>

Council discussed if/how to respond to latest update - request to write to the Minister, Baroness Jones, urging her to either support Lord Redesdale's Bill or to slot it into the Government's own Bill.

Council resolved to continue to offer support for both bills.

ML to continue to speak to potential candidates. JM suggested leafleting the village.

Council resolved to produce a quick leaflet to distribute to homes inviting residents to consider joining the Council.

Council resolved to revisit the idea of training once a defib had been sited at the community centre.

ii. Resident email: orchard pruning and harvesting. Council in favour of receiving a pruning workshop from Greener Growth, and considered the possibility of tying in with the volunteering group. To review once costings have been provided.

At the end of the meeting Cllr Loveridge resigned as Chair and Councillor.

Fornham All Saints Parish Council November Meeting

Draft Minutes from Parish Council Meeting

Tuesday 19th November 2024, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

These draft minutes will be approved at the Parish Council Meeting on 21st January, 2025.

Present:

Cllr Richard Nicholls (RN) (Acting Chair) and Cllrs Jill Mayhew, Derek Brown (DB) and David Surman (DS). Clerk Justin Hook (JH), Josh Harris (All Saints Hotel) and 1 member of the public.

Agenda Items

- 1. <u>Chairman's welcome, opening remarks and to receive apologies for absence</u>
 - Apologies received and accepted from Cllr Stewart, Cllr Lynch, District Cllr Broughton and County Cllr Hopfensperger.
- 2. (i) To receive members Declarations of Interests none received.
 - (ii) Council to consider any new written requests for dispensation and/or requests which have been received none received.
- 3. To approve & adopt the minutes from the Council meeting held on 15th October 2024
 - Council resolved to adopt the minutes from the previous meeting and the Chair signed them.
- 4. <u>To receive County Councillor's report from Cllr. Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>
 - None received.
- 5. <u>To receive Borough Councillor's reports from Cllr. Sarah Broughton and Cllr Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>

6. Public open session up to 15 minutes - questions and issues on matters arising from the agenda and from the village
Resident raised the road safety issue regarding the hedging between Sheepwash Bridge and the Anglian Water (AW) entrance. Hedging encroaching into carriageway, causing buses and lorries to go round the corner on the wrong side of the road - lots of near misses already and an accident waiting to happen.

Clerk advised technically this is a Fornham St Martin/ Genevieve issue, but has contacted their Clerk, as well as Cllr Broughton and Cllr Hopfensperger for assistance. Clerk also raised on highways reporting tool and item being considered by SCC for potential actions.

Action: Clerk to follow up.

Resident also raised issue of water escaping from fire hydrant opposite AW entrance, causing mud and debris on the road and pavement and potential ice hazard as winter sets in.

Clerk had already raised with AW and is marked for repair.

Action: Clerk to follow up.

Resident asked if there was any plans to change the double mini roundabouts in the villasge, after the closure of Tut Hill, highlighting the difficulty in crossing that junction as a pedestrian, in any direction.

Council are unaware of any plans to change that junction, but agree crossing it can be very difficult due to width of road and amount of traffic.

Action: Clerk to speak to Cllr Hopfensperger to identify any options moving forwards.

Following the 'updates' email from Sarah Drane at WSC Planning regarding All Saints Hotel, Council were able to clarify some items with Josh Harris.

Council showed concern for use of the lodges by contractors not holidaymakers and that parking was not to be at the lodge site, nor in front of individual lodges.

Mr Harris confirmed that no stays were longer than the

permitted 3 month stays and that there had been issues getting golf buggies across to the main hotel for parking and that AS were talking with WSC about what could be done regarding parking.

Council reminded Mr Harris that parking at the lodge site was not part of the approved planning application and that it was AS's responsibility to comply and police this.

Resident thanked Mr Harris for the works to the ditch on B1106, which was echoed by the Council. Council asked Mr Harris to remove the debris that had been left behind in the ditch so as to not impede drainage.

Mr Harris confirmed that a further 6,000 whips were to be ordered to complete planting across the site. Council reminded Mr Harris that the second part of the felling licence replant along the B1106 for circa 11 trees, was yet complete. Mr Harris agreed to follow this up.

Council agreed that the update email from Sarah Drane was very useful and would like to continue to receive updates.

7. To receive reports from Councillors:

- a. Traffic / Roads / VASs / Road Signs Cllr Lynch none received.
- b. Volunteering Derek Brown DB reported another successful session litter picking. Former Chair & Cllr Martin Loveridge will continue heading up the group, with no more sessions planned until spring next year. Thanks to Tony Mayhew for cleaning the Pound Meadow bus stop.
- c. Facilities / Assets Management / Community Centre / EV - Derek Brown
 - No problems reported. EV charging idea is ongoing. Community Council meeting 26th November and will vote on whether to proceed with the slow chargers being provided by the scheme.
- d. Local Businesses & Residents / Lark Valley Richard Nicholls
 - RN and the Clerk met James Pickerin from SCC

Rights of Way team to walk the Lark Valley Path from Sheepwash Bridge to just past Duck Sluice Farm. Works are due to take place before Christmas to secure the bank in a number of places and to lift the fallen fencing now overgrown with brambles. The Lark Valley Path is one of only three paths in Suffolk that gets three cuts per year. The potential was discussed for Council to pay the contractor extra, to cut wider on each of the three cuts to help keep the path clearer for longer. Estimate £200-300 per cut.

Action: Clerk to add to a Spring agenda.

Question was raised over who put up the Harris fencing either side of the B1106.

Action: Josh Harris to check if AS did this.

- e. Social Issues / Village Voice Jill Mayhew Nothing to report. Email re: winter tool-kit to be included in magazine.
- f. Marham Park / Highways / Village Hall / Anglian Water (Lark) Clerk none received.
- g. Allotments David SurmanNothing to report.

8. To receive Clerks report

The Clerk advised that after attending a SALC training session on Councils acting as Sole Trustees of a Charity, more work will be required to differentiate Council business from Charity business.

DB advised that if the EV charging at the Community Centre project moves forwards, then deed documents would be required, showing ownership.

Question was raised if the land is registered?

Action: Clerk to review Charity activity in the new year.

9. Planning:

i. DC/24/0614/FUL - RE-CONSULTATION
 All Saints Hotel, Fornham St Genevieve, IP28 6JQ
 Planning application - partial change of use of golf course to site six timber pods and associated

engineering works

Council resolved to record a vote of no comment.

ii. DC/24/1495/TPO

Old Rectory The Green, Fornham All Saints, IP28 6JX TPO 115 (1986) tree preservation order - two Horse Chestnut (C1 and C2 on plan within G2 on order) overall crown reduction and lift by up to three metres b. one Oak (H1 on plan within G2 on order) overall crown reduction by two metres and removal of branches around incoming electric cable

Council resolved to support this application.

Council to discuss revised NALC pay scales, effective 1st April 2024. Clerk's pay scale 18 increased from $\mathfrak{L}15.21$ to $\mathfrak{L}15.84$ per hour, equating to $\mathfrak{L}191.10$ of back pay (5 months) and $\mathfrak{L}63.00$ extra to be budgeted for the remainder of the financial year (5 months)

Council resolved to approve the Clerks pay increase and back pay in line with the revised NALC pay scale.

Council noted Clerks review to be scheduled for January.

Winter Tool Kit

Supporting Each Other: Focus on Winter

by West Suffolk Council

You may have heard **Winter Fuel Payments** being discussed in the news recently. They used to be paid to everyone over State Pension age, regardless of their income. This has now changed. Only people who get **Pension Credit** will receive the one off Winter Fuel Payment this year.

And it's not just help with heating costs - getting Pension Credit opens the door to additional benefits such as help with the cost of dental work, glasses and transport to hospital; help with rent or mortgage interest; and help paying Council Tax. Not to mention a free TV Licence for those aged 75 and over.

A lot of people think if they have savings they won't be entitled, but that is not always the case. While 1.4 million households in the UK already receive Pension Credit, an estimated 880,000 people are eligible for it, but not receiving it.

Can you help us reach these people?

If you have friends or family over State Pension age (currently 66), ask them if they have checked their eligibility. They can find out more here: www.gov.uk/pension-credit, or by calling 0800 99 1234. Applications can be made online or over the phone.

Further down you will find some useful resources. You don't need to be an expert on Pension Credit: just encourage people to check their eligibility themselves, or support them to do so, either over the phone 0800 99 1234 or online: www.gov.uk/pension-credit

The quickest way to apply for Pension Credit is to call the claim line 0800 99 1234 (a friend or family member can call for them as long as they are with the person at the time) or go online: www.gov.uk/pension-credit

What about people who are not entitled to Pension Credit? Below you will find details of support throughout West Suffolk available to our communities who may find themselves vulnerable this winter.

The Government Funded Household Support Fund has been extended until March 2025 and is an allocation of funding given to Suffolk County Council to support people who are experiencing hardship or struggling with the rising costs. Suffolk County Council allocates Household Support Fund money to residents in a number of ways including Local Welfare Assistance Scheme (details below). September

For our September meeting we were enthusiastically welcomed by curator Claire Wallace to the newly restored Suffolk Regiment Museum at Gibraltar Barracks.

The Museum houses the artefacts and the collection of personal belongings and information on individuals who served in the Suffolk Regiment. The collection spans almost 300 years both in peace and war. We were invited to watch two short films on the Second World War, we saw the D-Day landings along the beaches in Operation Overlord on 6th June 1944, which was the offensive that started the invasion of occupied Western Europe by the allied forces. Also the liberation of Caen eventually achieved on 19th July 1944. These films included interviews with some of the brave members of the Suffolk Regiment who took part in these and other operations.

Following this we were taken up to the Museum, first opened in 1935, where we had the opportunity to admire the extensive displays, which tell the story of the Suffolk Regiment from its foundation in 1685 to the amalgamation with the Royal Norfolk in 1959 to form 1st East Anglian Regiment. A fascinating collection and well worth a visit.

October

The October meeting was our 106th birthday! Adrian Tindall who is the Chair of the Bury St Edmunds Tour Guides spoke on 'A Handsome Little Town' which was a virtual tour of Bury St Edmunds. BSE's name is derived from King Edmund, a Christian, who was killed by the Danes for refusing to renounce his faith and martyred as a saint. His remains were enshrined at BSE Abbey which became a famous pilgrimage destination and one of the largest and grandest monasteries in England (now the ruins in the Abbey Gardens). Computer aided designs showed the Abbey complex to be quite magnificent.

BSE played a part in Magna Carter in 1214 when a group of barons met secretly at St Edmunds Abbey to swear an oath

to compel King John to accept the Charter of Liberties. Whilst telling the story of BSE, its buildings and personalities we enjoyed wonderful images of the town.

We were enthralled. A marvellous speaker which had us all promising to look for the historical places we had just seen on the screen. As it was our birthday meeting we enjoyed tea and cake!

November

At the age of 98 Joy Tuplin amused us all by recounting some of her working life with wit and humour. Wanting to work at the age of 5, Joy's Father suggested she pick some carnations from the garden, tie them in bunches and sell them at the garden gate. Which she did, and was very thrilled to earn some money – giving half to her Mother and half to her savings tin!

She did a milk round when very young, a variety of jobs, then trained as a nurse and worked in A&E in London, went on to train as a psychiatric nurse, eventually looking after homes and animals for people all over the country. Finally retiring at the age of 84! A fascinating glimpse into the life of a most extraordinary lady. Naturally we celebrated Joy's birthday with a cake, which had the most amazing candle!!

The Fornham Ladies Group met on 16th October 2024 at the FSM village hall. Apologies were given for those not able to attend.

The speaker for this month was Mark Ellis, a police officer. He has served over 30 years and before that 2 years as a special constable. His talk was on Modern Day Policing. Policing started in the 1880s and before that there were Sheriffs. A great change has taken place because of modern technology now in existence, phones being used instead of actually going to the police station.

Most crimes are local, but possession of cars makes it easier for criminals to travel further afield. Also, domestic abuse and mental health problems are having to be dealt with. The police are scrutinised more closely now and one's job could be lost if reported for brutality.

There are lots of reasons for the police being contacted and there is more crime committed in the dark. The police have in the past been called the "Thin Blue Line" and this is still true. Community policing is carried out. Various slides of different uniforms worn over the years and also means of transport were shown.

CSI are called to crime scenes when the area concerned is immediately cordoned off.

DNA, created in 1986, can be obtained from fingerprints, which are different for each individual, apart from twins who must show at least 16 points to verify that they are twins. Ear prints are also unique.

Weaponry used to assist are tasers, PAVA (a long distance spray), single shot guns, truncheons and stingers, which he showed to us and of course dogs.

There were lots of statistics given. There is now a custody suite in BSE. Suffolk has a low crime rate.

It was a very interesting talk with several funny anecdotes included.

Mark was thanked and very kindly donated his fee to the Motor Neurone group.

Educational Visit

They concluded their visit with a quick look at the Medieval flushings on the outside.

They walked back to their base having gained more information from the church for their future studies. I enjoyed their visit, I hope they did too.



Remembrance Service at the War Memorial

Nearly 40 people gathered at the War Memorial to join Reverend Miller, Rev Sarah Gull and Scarlett Blacker in remembering the fallen from the village. As usual Grenfell Scoulding laid a wreath remembering his grandfather Samuel Scoulding who died in the first world war fighting for

his country. Further wreaths were laid by The Women's Institute and The Parish Council.

Returning to the Church, we heard the Last Post being played recorded from the Cenotaph Remembrance Service in London in 1962 when villager Tony Mayhew was selected to play the Last Post. His father was also involved in the service as Drum Major. There followed much chat and discussion over with coffee and delicious refreshments.

The Funeral of Peter Adams

The Church was packed with over 200 in the congregation many of whom had travelled from across Europe as well from around the UK. The service was led by Peter's son, the Reverend John Adams, assisted by Peter's daughter, Josephine Pearce. The music was provided by the organist from St Mary's, Bury and a trumpeter from Epsom, Surrey. The singing throughout was hearty, beginning with 'Guide me O thou great Redeemer.' The duet of trumpet and organ playing the Rutter blessing was particularly memorable.

Josephine read the moving eulogy showing Peter's amazing experiences in his very full life. The eulogy was completed with a sentence from each of the six grandchildren.

Afterwards everyone returned to the barns at Church Farm. More entertainment followed with the family song first sung at Peter's 70th birthday, namely The Peter Jameson Song, or simply P.J.P. Jameson A. This was a wonderful way to complete the most amazing funeral and celebration of a special man and good friend to so many.

Peter Adam's Eulogy

Hello, for those that don't know me, I am Peter's daughter Josephine. Thank you all so much for the efforts you have made to join us here today, to honour his life and grieve his death. It means so much to Isa, John and I to feel how loved he was, by so many. Aided by Peter's generous memoires, I will do my best to paint a picture of who he was.

The first point about Peter is that he was a man of colossal courage, with

an insatiable appetite for adventure. His earliest memory was on the Empire Windrush on his way to India, when aged two he was spurred by his mother to go up to deck to view the rock of Gibraltar. By the time he had summoned up the courage to go it alone, the famous Rock was a mere speck in the distance, but by contrast his internal flame of courage had begun a lifetime of growth.

This set the scene for a series of adventures which even he, as a 77 year old man, described as 'pretty extreme': Adventures such as jumping out of planes in a parachute; helping out in two wars as a medical volunteer, galloping over enormous hedges on horseback with his two children in tow, taking those same children aged eight and six on an exploration of Malaysia in 1991, flying on Aeroflot via Moscow, which was still distinctly Soviet in spirit.

Even in his latter years of illness, he was fearless in his attempts to keep going, undertaking trips to the Scilly Isles, Devon and London whilst the rest of us looked on with anxiety. But he was always buoyed by his adventures, and always made it home in one piece, claiming until his last days to be in 'peak condition.'

When he was a child, his parents lived across an array of exotic locations, including Quetta, Dortmund, Berlin, Penang and Lympne, all before the age of 14.

His core memories of his family included his courageous mother in a dress with cartwheels on, waving him off on a tropical airstrip in Penang before a year of separation. He was only ten. And then his kind, humorous father disembarking in the jungle thirty minutes later, again beginning a year of separation. His dear brother Tim, his wingman in the early days of sleeper trains, coal trucks and ponies, and a fantastic support in his last chapters of illness.

His childhood on the move instilled in him a lifelong pull to travel, to be on the move, to go "Off Again", as his first book was entitled. He associated distant lands with colour, excitement, humour, variety and ultimately a feeling of coming home. He learnt numerous languages flawlessly, to bring himself one step closer to foreign worlds.

His wanderlust led him to begin a glamorous and contented first career as a relief station officer across Asia for BOAC. He learnt to laugh with his local colleagues about the various banana skins they slipped on, and found satisfaction in the sight of big planes taking off to the glow of tropical runways.

However, he had also learnt that there is more joy to be found in giving than receiving, and so took the courageous decision in his late twenties to pursue a calling of greater purpose, and to retrain as a doctor. The process began with a return to science O levels, and ended with a community of satisfied and grateful patients, whom he always gave the time of day.

Peter has always had a particular gift of striking up unlikely friendships

in unlikely places, driven by his lifelong practice of getting into deep conversation with strangers at any moment. You only had to turn your back for a minute, and he had found a conversation partner, built rapport, and unearthed the most personal parts of their life story in record speed.

The peak example of this happened in a seedy laundrette in southeast London in 1973, where he got talking to a beautiful young German medical student, who had dyed her doctor's coat pink with her red flares. Whilst I'm not sure he knew how to sort out the coat, he did find himself a wife that day. From that encounter in the laundrette followed a string of romantic gestures, and a long and fulfilling marriage of 48 years. Isa was his 'bestest', a great companion and comfort to him until he drew his last breath by her side, in his bed at home, overlooking the church where we are gathered today.

He was gifted not only at hitting it off with strangers, but also at cultivating lifelong friendships. Many of you here are wonderful old pals of his, your friendship dating back way beyond my birth. Thank you, your friendship meant the world to him. Henry was his best friend from the age of six to the age of eighty, despite the geographical distance between Fornham All Saints and the Genting Highlands in Malaysia. It was after golden visits from Henry and his brother Tim, a few days before his death, that dad turned to mum and said 'thank you for bringing all these wonderful people to see me,' and seemed finally ready to slip away.

When John and I flew the nest, he addressed a speech to us based on Khalil Gibran's 'On Children'. Just as the poem dictates, as a parent he was a steady bow that allowed his children to fly. Loving us always, but propelling us on our own adventures, armed with a map of the world and his lessons on courage.

His sartorial elegance was unrivalled. He had a beautiful wardrobe consisting of only the finest garments, most of which were older than his own children, and had been lovingly restored over the years, making him an unwitting icon of contemporary sustainability ideals.

He was a true gent, who always stood up when people came into the room, always walked people who helped at home to the gate when they left, and always queued up behind the prisoners to go through high security doors when he was a prison volunteer in retirement. Much to the surprise of the prison guards who bemusedly asked themselves "who's that guy in brogues in the queue?"

He was a romantic, who whisked Isa off her feet, armed with punnets of strawberries and a promise of adventure in far off lands. The first time he met my husband Jo, at Henley Regatta, he picked us up in a rowing boat, only narrowly missing the MS Windsor castle with 200 revellers on board. At our wedding in 2015, he delivered a speech inspired by Pushkin's Captain's Daughter, where I was the daughter, and he was my captain, delighted about my marriage but heartbroken to let me go.

No eulogy of Peter's would be complete without mentioning his love of

words. From the moment his father gave him an Italian leather diary at the age of 10, he learnt that "the process of writing down my recollections has emphasised to me what a wonderful life I enjoyed." He self-published his first book, "Off Again', bringing to life trips, types and talks from his life, exuberantly announcing that every man has a book within himself. As it turns out, Peter had four more books within himself, and published his swansong, the aptly titled "Blowing for Home", just months before his death.

For decades he devotedly penned weekly letters to John and me, in his signature turquoise ink and almost illegible handwriting. He raised us bilingually, committed to keeping up the German, even as his hearing failed him, and took great joy in playing with words from different languages to humorous effect. "Heidenreihe", his word for Heathrow which back translates as "heathen row", "Leberteichstrasse" for Liverpool Street, which back translates as liver-pond-street, the Bejeezelwanger, the Doggerbank, the list goes on.

We've talked about his acts of service, but I'd be remiss to omit his love for good times, his understanding of the importance of 'getting one's nose in the trough of life'. He loved the exuberance of his days at Cambridge, always ensured we had enough 'jam' (aka enjoyment) in our lives, pulled out all the stops for a glorious wedding for Jo and me in Germany. He could laugh for days, about things that really weren't that funny.

We will always remember Peter's idiosyncrasies. The man with the horn-rimmed glasses, the sartorial elegance, the Greenflash running shoes, the brick phone, the gentle heart and the beautiful words. When I asked him how he would like his grandchildren to remember Oppa, he said "I actually don't need them to remember my successes or that I was a doctor or a soldier. It may sound terribly wet but I'd like them to know that Oppa loved them." Today is a sad day, but I know he would have wanted us all to take comfort in the fact that he loved us, each and every one of us.

I'd like to close with some of his own words from the epilogue of his final book. Words which he penned with so many of the people in this room in mind. They hit the emotional high notes, but let's give it a go.

"It has been a good life, in which I have met many interesting, generous and amusing people. I was in full time education for 26 years. I have had the good fortune to be able to travel extensively in Europe and Asia. I have married the right girl, who has given me two wonderful children. I have sustained, not without difficulty, a useful professional career. God has watched over me, and, when the call comes, I am ready to go. I thank my readers for their interest, friendship and love."

Quiet Lanes in the UK are minor rural roads that are designated to prioritise the needs of vulnerable road users such as walkers, cyclists and horse riders.

The Highway Code instructs drivers to use Quiet Lanes slowly and carefully and be prepared to stop to allow people extra time to pass them in safety.

We have one commencing on Mere Lane, just beyond the 3 Kings pub.





- 2. Review Minutes of last Meeting 30 July 2024
 - a. Minutes reviewed. All agreed.
 - b. Bottle banks It was discussed that all houses are going to have 2 more waste bins provided, one for food and one for glass in 2026. This also includes commercial buildings, but these are from May 2025. Information received from West Suffolk council to register.
 - c. Regarding the green area where the bottle banks used to be and purchasing of plants, this will be added to the agenda for next Parish Council meeting on 15 October 24.
 - d. DB will come with plates to repair the door (see 5 (e) below)
- 3. Hall Booking Update EG updated on hall bookings.
 - a. Bookings The wedding booking for whole weekend was cancelled. All weekends in October booked, November bookings are quieter at the moment.
- 4. Treasurer Update AE
 - a. Total in account £51,652.87 compared to £62,113.29 this time last year.
 - b. Profit and Loss Total Income £21,804.70 Total expenses £32,251.13. This is due to expenditure of car

- park upgrade.
- c. Next meeting will be the AGM and the Treasurer will go through the final annual accounts at that meeting.
- 5. Hall & Ground Maintenance/Future Facilities
 - Painting not completed by previous painter who has now left the area. VC to put a request on NextDoor for decorator. ONGOING
 - b. Gatepost big split in one of the gateposts. PP has contacted contractor who supplied the gatepost. Gate is now sagging. Contractor adjusted the gate but not sorted the split post. A new post has been requested. Contractor will come and assess. ACTION: PP
 - Sewerage complaint regarding drain overflowing.
 DrainDoctor came and sorted. Septic tank still needs to be emptied. Need a cover for drain – PP will action.
 EG will arrange for tank to be emptied. ONGOING
 - d. Corner covers for walls need to be repaired. EG will try and fix first. ACTION: EG
 - e. Main Door PP and DB will repair the cracked door.
 DB will bring plates to repair the door. ACTION: PP & DB
- 6. Refurbished building still ongoing. MJ has updated drawings and these are now ready. Discussion regarding the next phase. These will be given to the structural engineers (Andrew Firebrace Partnership) so they can prepare the final design. There will be a cost for this. £5000 was allocated last year for this purpose. After which a Quantity Surveyor needs to approve the final proposals. Any grants that are available will be applied for. ACTION: PP and EG will visit Andrew Firebrace Partnership.
- 7. Plug in Suffolk (Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Points) Site visit happening 2 October 24. Previous meetings had been held via Teams (on line meetings) EV chargers to fully charge a completely flat battery could take 7hrs and works 24/7. This would mean only 4 car charges a day. Cheap rate between midnight and 6am would

mean a whole parking space tied up during this time. If we had three phase electricity, we could have the higher chargers rather than the slower 7w. AE advised that the paperwork said if supply was there they could provide higher chargers. £200 per year guaranteed and £1 per 100kw (approx. 65p per car that charges). This whole facility in the village is more about providing the service than making a profit.
