# Fornham All Saints Parish Council November Meeting

**Approved Minutes from Parish Council Meeting** 

Tuesday 19th November 2024, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

These minutes were be approved at the Parish Council Meeting on 21st January, 2025.

#### **Present:**

Cllr Richard Nicholls (RN) (Acting Chair) and Cllrs Jill Mayhew, Derek Brown (DB) and David Surman (DS). Clerk Justin Hook (JH), Josh Harris (All Saints Hotel) and 1 member of the public.

### **Agenda Items**

- 1. Chairman's welcome, opening remarks and to receive apologies for absence
  - Apologies received and accepted from Cllr Stewart, Cllr Lynch, District Cllr Broughton and County Cllr Hopfensperger.
- 2. (i) To receive members Declarations of Interests none received.
  - (ii) Council to consider any new written requests for dispensation and/or requests which have been received none received.
- 3. To approve & adopt the minutes from the Council meeting held on 15th October 2024
  - Council resolved to adopt the minutes from the previous meeting and the Chair signed them.
- 4. <u>To receive County Councillor's report from Cllr. Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>
  - None received.
- 5. <u>To receive Borough Councillor's reports from Cllr. Sarah Broughton and Cllr Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>

#### None received.

6. Public open session up to 15 minutes - questions and issues on matters arising from the agenda and from the village
Resident raised the road safety issue regarding the hedging between Sheepwash Bridge and the Anglian Water (AW) entrance. Hedging encroaching into carriageway, causing buses and lorries to go round the corner on the wrong side of the road - lots of near misses already and an accident waiting to happen.

Clerk advised technically this is a Fornham St Martin/ Genevieve issue, but has contacted their Clerk, as well as Cllr Broughton and Cllr Hopfensperger for assistance. Clerk also raised on highways reporting tool and item being considered by SCC for potential actions.

Action: Clerk to follow up.

Resident also raised issue of water escaping from fire hydrant opposite AW entrance, causing mud and debris on the road and pavement and potential ice hazard as winter sets in.

Clerk had already raised with AW and is marked for repair.

Action: Clerk to follow up.

Resident asked if there was any plans to change the double mini roundabouts in the villasge, after the closure of Tut Hill, highlighting the difficulty in crossing that junction as a pedestrian, in any direction.

Council are unaware of any plans to change that junction, but agree crossing it can be very difficult due to width of road and amount of traffic.

Action: Clerk to speak to Cllr Hopfensperger to identify any options moving forwards.

Following the 'updates' email from Sarah Drane at WSC Planning regarding All Saints Hotel, Council were able to clarify some items with Josh Harris.

Council showed concern for use of the lodges by contractors not holidaymakers and that parking was not to be at the lodge site, nor in front of individual lodges.

Mr Harris confirmed that no stays were longer than the permitted 3 month stays and that there had been issues getting golf buggies across to the main hotel for parking and that AS were talking with WSC about what could be done regarding parking.

Council reminded Mr Harris that parking at the lodge site was not part of the approved planning application and that it was AS's responsibility to comply and police this.

Resident thanked Mr Harris for the works to the ditch on B1106, which was echoed by the Council. Council asked Mr Harris to remove the debris that had been left behind in the ditch so as to not impede drainage.

Mr Harris confirmed that a further 6,000 whips were to be ordered to complete planting across the site. Council reminded Mr Harris that the second part of the felling licence replant along the B1106 for circa 11 trees, was yet complete. Mr Harris agreed to follow this up.

Council agreed that the update email from Sarah Drane was very useful and would like to continue to receive updates.

### 7. To receive reports from Councillors:

- b. Volunteering Derek Brown DB reported another successful session litter picking. Former Chair & Cllr Martin Loveridge will continue heading up the group, with no more sessions planned until spring next year. Thanks to Tony Mayhew for cleaning the Pound Meadow bus stop.
- Facilities / Assets Management / Community Centre / EV - Derek Brown
   No problems reported. EV charging idea is ongoing.

#### **Nicholls**

RN and the Clerk met James Pickerin from SCC Rights of Way team to walk the Lark Valley Path from Sheepwash Bridge to just past Duck Sluice Farm. Works are due to take place before Christmas to secure the bank in a number of places and to lift the fallen fencing now overgrown with brambles. The Lark Valley Path is one of only three paths in Suffolk that gets three cuts per year. The potential was discussed for Council to pay the contractor extra, to cut wider on each of the three cuts to help keep the path clearer for longer. Estimate £200-300 per cut.

Action: Clerk to add to a Spring agenda.

Question was raised over who put up the Harris fencing either side of the B1106.

Action: Josh Harris to check if AS did this.

### 8. To receive Clerks report

The Clerk advised that after attending a SALC training session on Councils acting as Sole Trustees of a Charity, more work will be required to differentiate Council business from Charity business.

DB advised that if the EV charging at the Community Centre project moves forwards, then deed documents would be required, showing ownership.

Question was raised if the land is registered?

Action: Clerk to review Charity activity in the new year.

Council resolved to record a vote of no comment.

Old Rectory The Green, Fornham All Saints, IP28 6JX TPO 115 (1986) tree preservation order - two Horse Chestnut (C1 and C2 on plan within G2 on order) overall crown reduction and lift by up to three metres b. one Oak (H1 on plan within G2 on order) overall crown reduction by two metres and removal of branches around incoming electric cable

Council resolved to support this application.

Council discussed the proposed 2025/26 budget and made some minor changes.

Council resolved to apply for a precept of £25k, which would equate to a £0.57 increase (0.65%) for a band D property in the parish.

### 12. Revised NALC pay scales & Clerks review

Council to discuss revised NALC pay scales, effective 1st April 2024. Clerk's pay scale 18 increased from  $\mathfrak{L}15.21$  to  $\mathfrak{L}15.84$  per hour, equating to  $\mathfrak{L}191.10$  of back pay (5 months) and  $\mathfrak{L}63.00$  extra to be budgeted for the remainder of the financial year (5 months)

# Council resolved to approve the Clerks pay increase and back pay in line with the revised NALC pay scale.

Council noted Clerks review to be scheduled for January.

### 13. Skate & play park inspections

Council to note from report that remedial work required, but all low to very low risk

DB reported it would be prudent to consider a rolling plan to replace some items of equipment and budget for improvements to the fence and gate.

Action: DB to investigate potential costs.

Still waiting on previously ordered parts to make some simple repairs.

Action: Clerk to follow up.

### 14. Emergency Plan

Council to receive update

DS received an old 2016 emergency plan document from a previous chair, including details of how to start the gas generator. JM understood this document had been superseded. Council questioned the need and legal obligation for a plan.

Action: DS to invite contact from WSC to present to Council at a future meeting.

### 15. Microsoft subscription

Council to discuss renewal of subscription due January £59.99 per year for one, £79.99 per year for up to 6, personal licence

RN advised a number of apple trees have been lost.

Council discussed draft leaflet to attract new Councillors. Council agreed it should make clear that it is open to anybody over the age of 18.

Council resolved for Clerk to print with minor changes, and for JM to organise distribution.

### 19. Allotment AGM

Council noted the date of Allotment AGM set for Wednesday 4th December, 18:30 in the Village Hall.

### 20. <u>Upgrades to VAS equipment</u>

Council to discuss location of new solar powered VAS. Based on Elan City's suggestion, the ideal position would be roughly between the two properties fronting Larks Gate on the opposite side. Council will need a street furniture license from SCC, circa. £100.

Council resolved to approve the location for a new VAS unit and for the Clerk to proceed with purchase of new equipment and application for a Street Furniture License.

Action: RN agreed to approach the two Larks Gate properties.

Council resolved to increase Village Voice advertising costs to £90 per full page ad (from £84) and £54 per half page (from £45), effective February 2025.

# Fornham All Saints Parish Council January Meeting

### **Draft Minutes from Parish Council Meeting**

Tuesday 21st January, 2025, 18:30, Fornham All Saints Community Centre

These draft minutes will be approved at the Parish Council Meeting on 17th February, 2025.

#### Present:

Derek Brown (DB) (Acting Chair), Cllrs Don Lynch (DL), Mat Stewart (MS) and David Surman (DS).

District Cllr Sarah Broughton (SB), County Councillor Rebecca Hopfensperger (RH), Clerk Justin Hook (JH), Hannah Cuthbertson (HC) from All Saints Hotel (AS) and 1 member of the public.

### Agenda Items

- 1. <u>Chairman's welcome, opening remarks and to receive apologies for absence</u>
  - The chair opened the meeting and welcomed all those in attendance. Apologies received and accepted from Cllr Nicholls.
- 2. (i) To receive members Declarations of Interests none received.
  - (ii) Council to consider any new written requests for dispensation and/or requests which have been received none received.
  - Council resolved to approve and adopt the minutes, the Chairman signed them.
- 3. <u>To receive County Councillor's report from Cllr. Rebecca Hopfensperger</u>
  - RH reported on SCC's decision to put themselves forward for the governments initial plans for devolution, which would see a new authority formed, removing the old

two-tier district and county council structure for greater streamlining and budget saving. Town and parish councils would likely remain the same, with some changes to a centralised planning team and parish councils no longer being consultees on planning applications. SCC's rationale was it's better to be at the table for the first round, to have greater control in shaping the way forward. There is information on the SCC website and SALC are giving regular updates.

Another major change would be the creation of a new Norfolk and Suffolk Mayor - not like a town mayor, instead a single person to be a strategic consultant between the new authority and central government.

Action: Clerk to send links to devolution updates.

Road signs: RH has is now ordering through her localities budget from G-Signs in Risby. Fitting will follow soon.

- 4. To receive Borough Councillor's reports from Cllr. Sarah Broughton and Cllr Rebecca Hopfensperger Nothing to report.
- 5. Public open session up to 15 minutes questions and issues on matters arising from the agenda and from the village Resident re-raised safety of crossing at the double mini roundabouts. RH had advised of the safe crossing between the mini roundabouts and community centre, but Clerk had misunderstood resident was trying to cross diagonally using the island in between the mini roundabouts, which gives poor visibility to traffic coming from Bury.

ACTION: RH to request engineer visit to assess site. RH to advise Clerk once date agreed. Clerk to advise council and resident.

Resident re-raised issue of hedges along B1106 - technically still outside FAS boundary. Lower part of hedges have been trimmed, but overhanging tops still causing larger vehicles into middle of road causing danger to oncoming traffic and pedestrians.

ACTION: Clerk to report again, with updated info.

Resident request for a village Christmas tree.

Some thought was given to the idea, but item to be scheduled for a future agenda.

Defibrillators were raised and their accessibility from different points in the village. RH and SB offered to help fund one for the community centre.

Who are the village's first responders?

ACTION: Clerk to investigate.

HC confirmed there are defibs at All Saints Hotel and can be accessed from reception. HC will make the AS team aware of this arrangement.

It was suggested that defib information be included in the Village Voice.

Plans being considered for a mobile fish and chip van Tuesday evenings.

social issues. RH & SB confirmed they meet 6 monthly with Thingoe Lodge.

ACTION: Clerk to send intro email to Sylvia and continue to reach out to Rural Coffee Caravan for dates.

Clerk reported Village Voice advertising invoices all sent for the 2025/26 period and monies starting to come in.

f. Marham Park / Highways / Village Hall / Anglian Water (Lark) - Mat Stewart

MS reported parking issues with cars on the road since David Lloyd opened and the car park always seems full. RH is looking into this.

Re-planting hedges and trees still ongoing.

ACTION: RH to chase and keep pressure on.

Section 106 monies for path still unspent but contact gone quiet.

ACTION: RH/SB to chase.

Nothing more from AW currently.

g. Allotments / Emergency Plan - David Surman Allotments all good.

Old emergency plan given to Clerk to scan in to form basis of new plan. Tariq, the contact from WSC willing to come to a meeting if required.

Clerk having some difficulties setting up new banking with Unity Trust, and requesting to change to Lloyds.

Council resolved to change banking switch from Unity Trust to Lloyds.

Parts have arrived for the play area and will be fitted when weather warms.

RH confirmed that skirting back is no longer provided by SCC.

Council resolved to complete these works going with the cheaper of the quotes, assuming they have the necessary licenses to work on the highways.

Clerk confirmed as yet no quotes have been received for the grass cutting other than WSC. Ongoing.

HC highly recommended the company that AS use for their grass cutting, RG Landscapes.

### 13. Pruning workshop for community orchard

The Clerk met with Paul Read and Celia Stone from Suffolk Traditional Orchard Group who were part of the team that helped set up and fund the orchard. Having inspected each of the 19 trees, the general consensus was that they are healthy trees, on good strong root stocks, that will produce good crops. Some simple maintenance was completed and inventory taken where labels could be found. The advice was that pruning could be done to encourage improved growth, but that left to their own devices, the trees would still produce well naturally. A pruning workshop could be arranged, but it would need to be done mid Feb, with the works completed by end of Feb.

Thought was given to potentially involve the volunteering group, the Fornham Garden Club and allotment holders.

Council resolved that it was too short notice to arrange, and therefore to plan to consider the idea of a pruning workshop again at the latter part of the year, leaving the site 'natural' for this next season.

### A Devolution Deal for Suffolk

### **Empowering Suffolk's Future**

You may have heard the word 'devolution' a lot recently and wondered what does that even mean?

We found some useful information on the Suffolk County Council website. See below for a brief introduction and keep an eye on their website for further updates.

Suffolk County Council has been invited to apply to be part of the government's devolution priority programme.

It's part of the government's English Devolution White Paper, which seeks to devolve powers and funding from central government to local leaders and Mayors - whilst at the same time reorganising existing council structures in two-tier areas like Suffolk.

This would simplify and streamline council structures so it's easier for residents to understand and save taxpayers money.

### **Update 9th January 2025**

Suffolk should be fast tracked for devolution and local government reorganisation, councillors have decided.

Following an invitation from ministers, Suffolk County Council's Cabinet today agreed to recommend Suffolk for inclusion in the government's Devolution Priority Programme (DPP), which would see the creation of a directly elected Mayor (likely covering Suffolk and Norfolk) and the replacement of existing council structures with a streamlined unitary council being set up.

The decision followed a debate and vote at a meeting of all county councillors.



### How to use a defibrillator

Call 999 and start CPR. If you're on your own, do not stop CPR, if possible, send someone else to find one. When you call 999, the operator can tell you if there's a public access defibrillator nearby.

Anyone can use a defibrillator. You do not need training. Once you turn it on, it will give clear step-by-step voice instructions. Many defibrillators also have visual prompts and images showing how to use it.

The device checks the person's heart rhythm and will only tell you to give them a shock if it's needed. You cannot shock yourself or someone else accidentally.

### Steps to using a defibrillator

- **Step 1:** Press the green button to switch on the defibrillator and follow the instructions.
- **Step 2:** Remove the person's clothing above the waist.
- **Step 3:** Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the person's bare skin. Put one pad on each side of the chest as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.
- **Step 4:** Once you have attached the pads, stop CPR and do not touch the person. The defibrillator will then check the person's heart rhythm.
- **Step 5:** The defibrillator will decide whether a shock is needed. If so, it will tell you to press the 'shock' button. An automatic defibrillator will shock the person without you needing to do anything. Do not touch the person while they're being shocked.
- **Step 6:** The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been given and whether you need to continue CPR.
- **Step 7:** If the defibrillator tells you to continue to do CPR, continue with chest compressions until the person shows signs of life, or the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again.

### Fornham Garden Club - Hedgehogs

Lynda Brignall originally trained as a midwife but her interest with hedgehogs started when she found an injured hedgehog and took it to the Hedgehog Hospital run by a lady called Sue at Ousden. Sue started doing this in her home but then purchased 27 acres of land with the hope of opening a wildlife sanctuary. She now has around 100 hedgehogs which are spread around several helpers throughout the area.

Hedgehogs are now classed as vulnerable to extinction. In the 1950's there were about 50 million but in 2022 there were only about 500,000. They survive in both urban and rural locations, dislike rain and wet areas, can walk up to 2 miles a night and are non-aggressive calm creatures. They are nocturnal, have a great sense of smell but poor eyesight. Their lifespan is 2-5 years, but are solitary and do not mate for life. Adult males are called boars and adult females are sows. There are different colours - dark brown, albino, blonde and black. Babies are called urchins or hoglets and leave the nest at about 8 weeks old. Hedgehogs have a vast vocabulary with all sounds having specific meanings.

Their diet contains beetles, earthworms and caterpillars, but they will eat roadkill, birds eggs, apples and suet balls. They are lactose intolerant and should not be given bread or mealworms. Hedgehogs hibernate where their breathing slows to one breath every few minutes and should always be left alone, especially if disturbed with their babies, as they may eat the babies if scared.

It is advisable to never handle a hedgehog without gloves as there are diseases and external parasites present. If you find an injured hedgehog please call the Hedgehog Hospital or a vet who would contact for you. Please be careful using mowers and strimmers to avoid injuries. Fornham Garden Club meets the second Tuesday of each month at Fornham All Saints Community Centre from 7pm for 7.30.

### Fornham St Martin Ladies Club

The Fornham Ladies Group met on 15th January 2025 at the FSM village Hall.

The speaker for this month was Robin Howe, previously a magistrate in Suffolk for 30 years leaving the bench in 2017. Robin has over 30 years' experience working for the local authority and 10 years for Community Mental Health Services. Robin always had an interest in the criminal justice system and was asked to provide four references and undertake a detailed recruitment process which took 18 months in order to become a magistrate. The role is voluntary with no remuneration apart from expenses.

When Robin was appointed there were a number of Courts throughout Suffolk these have now closed and Ipswich is the only one left in operation. Magistrates Courts deal with all criminal cases in the first instance unless the defendant elects for Crown Court or the bench deems that they are unable to serve a high enough sentence for the crime committed. Ninety percent of all criminal cases are heard in a magistrate's court and Robin has sat in a number of courts for example Family Court, Appeals Court and Traffic Offences. The bench consists of three members who are assisted by a legal advisor. Sentencing can be delayed if waiting for probation reports. In order to convict, the bench must be sure the defendant is guilty beyond reasonable doubt. In the majority of cases the defender pleads guilty. The sentence is discounted for a timely plea and the need for witnesses is not required. Bail can be one of the most challenging decisions and the bench must give a reason if they deny bail for example will the defendant return to court, commit further offences or interfere with witnesses. Magistrates Courts can grant search warrants and the extension of custody time when requested by the Police. Waiting times currently for a case to come to Court is 2028 due to a lack of Courts and Judges.

In Robin's experience the use of Community payback is a success and often offenders end up doing more work than is needed and engage well with it. When setting a fine for an offender you need to be mindful, does that person have the ability to pay the fine? England currently jails more people prorata that other country in Europe.

It was a very interesting talk with several funny anecdotes included and a lively discussion. Robin was thanked for giving the talk.

## Minutes for Community Council Committee Meeting – Tuesday 7th January 2025 at 6pm

- 2. Review Minutes of last Meeting 26 November 2024
  - a. Minutes reviewed. All agreed.
- 3. Hall Booking Update EG updated on hall bookings.
  - a. Bookings bit slow at the moment. The Christmas Day booking took place but sadly the Boxing Day and New Years Eve bookings were cancelled. Bookings are traditionally slow at this time of year.
- 4. Treasurer Update AE
  - a. Total in account £51,419.86 compared to £51,652.87 this time last year. Earning less interest due to interest rates coming down.
  - b. Profit and Loss Total Gross Profit = £19,645 Total Expenses = (£11,417). Net Income = £8,228.
- 5. Hall & Ground Maintenance/Future Facilities
  - a. Gatepost There is a big split in one of the new gateposts. PP has contacted contractor who supplied the gatepost. Gate is now sagging. Contractor has adjusted the gate but not sorted the split post. A new post has been requested. Contractor will come and assess. ACTION: PP – Still ongoing.
  - Sewerage Septic tank still needs to be emptied.
     Need a replacement cover for drain ACTON: PP. EG

- will arrange for tank to be emptied. ONGOING. EG still trying to contact Andy's Jet Wash.
- Corner covers for walls have been temporarily repaired. Not going to fix at the moment due to new build.
- d. Main Door PP and DB will repair the cracked door. DB will bring plates to repair the door. Door has now been fixed. Thanks to DB for repairing this. COMPLETED
- e. Emergency light needs fixing ?needs new strip bulb. ACTION:PP
- Refurbished building PP has advised AFP to go 6. ahead. A meeting will be arranged in the New Year. PP to chase AFP to arrange the meeting. ACTION: PP Structural side of things is AFP domain. Once we know this then a Quantity Surveyor will be appointed. Structural and Architectural drawings are then quoted to give approximate figure for the whole project. Once this approximate figure is known then a contingency figure is added to including moving portacabin. Once guestimate is obtained then funding can be sought, but can also start looking for a contractors and obtain quotes. Once Engineers drawings for structural side are received, then planning permission can be applied for (approximately 2 months down the line). The new build project requires a Project Manager - AFP have recommended another architect who may be able to assist. It was agreed to get further down the line of project, before we look seriously for a Project Manager. Professional Indemnity insurance will be needed. Village Hall could act as temporary hall for some of the regular hall hirers.
- 7. Plug in Suffolk (Electric Vehicle (EV) Charging Points)– AE contacted Plug In Suffolk, there is not a chance of getting the higher volt but could possibly get 11kw chargers. DC is about £30000 to install, the others are cheaper (2k). DB recommended a company called Osprey who supply faster charging systems. Means going off in a different tangent and Community Centre would have to

pay for installation. DB will look into this, would mean Community Centre would keep all the money raised as paid for the installation. 30 minute top up is good business. Suffolk CC emailed PC today saying there may be other places in the village that may be interested. ACTION: Ongoing at the moment while we explore other avenues.

### 8. Any Other Business -

- a. DB Defibrillator what is happening to the installation at the Community Council. Training needs to be arranged – St Johns would possibly do the training for a donation. ACTION: EG.
- b. Land registry still ongoing. PC still looking into this.
- c. Emergency plan EG will pass on her folder to DB.
- d. Water board have advised of a leak. On checking the meter readings it does not show any leaks as some days show a zero usage. ACTION: AE to keep an eye on water bills.
- e. EG has been approached by a mobile fish and chip van who is asking if the village would be interested in them coming and parking at the Community Centre on a Tuesday. The Committee agreed to trial and see if viable. Wants to do a Tuesday night. 5pm to 8pm. Waiting for further details
- f. Car Boots After discussion it was agreed to continue with the car boot sales on the last Sunday of the month from April to September but will start at 8am rather than 7am.
- g. A discussion was held regarding employing a cleaner for a couple of hours a week on top of the volunteers who clean at the moment. ACTION: EG.
- 9. Date of Next Meeting: Tuesday 4 March 2025 at 6.00pm at the Community Centre.
